THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH December 2023

Dear All,

A very Happy Christmas to you and yours from Sue and I. I do hope all is well with you, and that each of our different churches know the deep joy of the God who draws close.

I'd like to tell you all about our Toddler Church Christmas Special. Our Toddler Christmas is at 4pm in St John's Backworth on Sunday December 10th.

Toddler Church was born in the summer of 2020. We'd had several baptisms at St John's. Each of those families then emailed to say 'we enjoyed that – when can we bring our children back to church?'

Given that – at that stage – the service at St John's was at 8.30 on a Sunday morning, we clearly needed to do something different. There's nothing new under the sun, and we reached for the 4pm on a Sunday afternoon slot. Our first Toddler Church was a Toddler Harvest in October 2020.

We weren't sure to begin with how many people would come. But we've been pleasantly surprised: Toddler Church has grown, and our highest attendance so far has been fifty – a collection of young families – a mix of adults and children.

For our very first edition, we'd had a planning meeting. Barbara Golightly, Kathy Henzell, Ali Griffiths and I together planned that first Toddler Harvest. But then I lapsed into planning it all myself. I myself would decide what to do, and tell the others. They were very patient with me.

Then enter Jo McEvedy. Jo is training to be a Reader in the Church of England. In layman's terms, that's like a lay preacher. Jo isn't going to be ordained, but she will lead worship and preach.

As part of Jo's training, she was invited to take on a project. We decided that Toddler Church was ripe for development. So 'developing Toddler Church' is Jo's project.

Finally! We got back to planning meetings: who says the vicar has all the best ideas? And indeed, when we met to plan for Toddler Christmas, the ideas flowed. Barbara showed us some pebbles, onto which she had painted various characters from the Christmas story. *Barbara* (not the vicar) will tell the children the Christmas story, in our new 'story zone' – the children sitting on brightly coloured cushions between the St John's choir pews.

Kathy is going to help with action songs. We're going to teach the children the chorus to 'O come all ye faithful'. Kathy will crouch down for the quiet line, half stand for the middling line, and stand up fully, arms outstretched, for the loud line: 'O come let us adore him, Christ the Lord'. Kathy is also going to make some mulled wine for the adults.

Meanwhile, Jo is going to play her saxophone as the families do an activity. They'll each make a 'Jesus in the manger' with straw stuck on a paper plate, while Jo plays 'Away in a manger' on the sax. Then we'll sing the carol as the children come out and display their mangers. Jo will also take the children to our new 'prayer zone', lighting candles up at the altar with the children kneeling at the altar rail.

Finally, there will be a knitted angel for each child, and we'll end our Christmas special with a praise shout: 'Glory to God! Peace on earth! Glory to God! Peace on earth!' May the world's trouble-spots indeed hear the message of the angels this Christmas as we pray for peace between Israel and the Palestinians, Ukraine and Russia. As we pray for an end to fighting in Sudan and the Yemen.

Toddler Church is designed with little children in mind. But people of all ages are welcome. Indeed, people of all ages come and join in the happy chaos. You'd be very welcome if you'd like to come – 4pm in St John's on Sunday December 10th.

Again, a very Happy Christmas when it comes, and a peaceful New Year to you and yours.





"Loved it!! I enjoyed the setting in Canada, so much so I went on google earth to find the locations and see the landscape. There is a complexity of ethnic immigrants and First Nations people which makes up this country and its impact on cultural communities is described nicely in this novel. Brilliant storytelling, strong female characters, going from Morgan to Elizabeth (I liked the format and short chapters), through different time spans, made for compelling reading on a rainy day.....into a joyful

day! Grief, loss, hardship, relationships, family secrets and love of nature and animals all dealt with sensitively as the connection and life experiences of Elizabeth and Morgan unwound. Two 'stand alone' characters coming together and finding so much. I also enjoyed getting to know the incidental characters, Marty, Laurie, Becca and the other family members too.

I liked the author's notes... strongly based on truth and real life near Thunder Bay.

I always wanted a dolls house and would often go along to Dolls House Exhibitions just looking. One day I was particularly attracted to a house which looked like the Victorian houses overlooking Cullercoats Bay, made by a gentleman in Crawcrook. It was however quite expensive, so I came home and thought about it! I could hear Don (my husband who had recently died) saying "just get it, just get it' so I did! It took about 5 months to make and consisted of 2 attics 6 main rooms and 2 rooms in the basement.

The front of the house is quite impressive having a tiled roof and 3 attic windows. The top floor has railed balconies outside the bedrooms and the other rooms, including the basement, are all bay windows You can reach the basement by a set of steps There are railings dividing the house from the pathway where there is a Victorian Post Box and lamp post. The most important thing on the house is the Sun Alliance insurance disc, if you didn't display one the fire brigade just let your house burn!

Then the house had to go to a Sparky, who lived in Whitburn, to have the lighting installed, which took 2 months. Then the fun started!

"Why, that's no offence," said the judge. "How early were you doing it?"





St Alban's Church Earsdon

Why a Netty Project?

Our church is 180 Years old and still does not have any toilets. The need to bring our church into the 21st Century is obvious.

What are we doing?

We plan to create a level entrance to the church with a gentle ramp. An accessible toilet will be added in the old boiler room, which is not used currently. Access will be via a new door through the wall next to the tower stairs. A second toilet will be added under the stairs. The entrance to the church is to be opened up and a kitchen installed on one side of the entrance under the balcony and a media room and office on the other side. To allow space in front of the kitchen and media room three rows of pews will be removed and reinstalled in the gallery.

What will it cost?

The current cost estimate is £209,000 based on the detailed specification produced by our architect. We are in the process of approaching a number of builders to get actual quotes for the work.

When will we start?

We need to get grants in place and this will take up to 6 months. We also need to raise more money by significant fund raising over the next 6 months. The planned start date is early summer 2024 with a build time of 4 or 5 months. All being well, we will be up and running in November 2024 well before Christmas.

How are we going to pay for it?

Currently in the bank in 'restricted' funds, we have £65,585.67. We have already received a small grant from 'W Spooner Trust' for £500.00. The grant team currently applying for large grants for £50,000 each and a number of slightly smaller grants. Combined we forecast this could give us a further £100,000.

This would leave a shortfall of around £45,000, which we will need to raise by fund raising. We need to create a 'Netty Fundraising Team' to organise a Grand Raffle, social media campaign, identify sponsors and other fund raising activities.

Doing the Message

I vividly remember the Christmas morning when I was 10 years old. On looking under our Christmas tree, I found presents for me – a selection box, a new jumper and a number of Dinky toys. These were great, but although I was not going to say anything, it was a little disappointing. However, when I walked into the kitchen for breakfast, there it was – a two wheeler bike; \sim a red and silver dream machine.

Alongside it was a big leather saddle bag which was a present from my Grandparents.

Grandad had been retired from the Durham coalmines on ill health grounds for some years, so this was a generous gift that they could ill-afford. With it came the request that I would put bike and bag to good use on Saturday mornings by doing their messages.

Consequently, every Saturday that I was able, I cycled the two miles or so from our house to theirs, and on receipt of their list, pedalled off to the shops. There were some constants on this list – bread and a cream cake from the Baker; eggs, boiled ham and pease pudding from the butcher; and some combination of fruit and vegetables from the greengrocer. Now and then there was a trip to the Post Office, Wool Shop, or cobblers, but not every Saturday.

When I'd completed the messages, I returned with all purchases crammed into my saddle bag and sometimes in an extra bag hanging from the handlebars, keeping my fingers crossed that everything would be in an un-squashed and presentable condition when I got back to my Grandparents. I confess that this was not always the case, I mean those back lanes of Shiney Row were not always smooth!

I realise that for some people my journeys would be described as going shopping or doing errands, but in our family, it was always a matter of doing the messages.

Now we are into the season of Advent with Christmas fast approaching it is the season of doing the messages. I don't just mean shopping and card writing but as we hear again the story of Christmas and its message of love it is an encouragement for me to <u>do</u> the message – even though all that is left of my bike is a rusty bell.



The story of 'Silent Night'

This much-loved carol comes from Austria, where it was first sung as *Stille Nacht, heilige Nacht* on Christmas Eve, 1818. It was written by Father Joseph Mohr, a young priest at St Nicholas parish church, in the village of Oberndorf bei Salzburg. As Christmas 1818 approached, he asked the local schoolmaster, Franz Xaver Gruber, to compose a melody for his carol. Gruber was organist in the nearby village of Arnsdorf, and so was happy to oblige. On Christmas Eve they presented the carol to the church during the midnight mass. The carol went on to become loved world-wide; and the version sung by Bing Crosby is the third best-selling single of all time.
