THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH July 2023

I have recently been pondering over the phrase "to live is to change", a phrase that is attributed to Cardinal John Henry Newton, and one that my college principal would often quote. I confess that I have often made this point to my children (when they *were* 'children') when they faced something different and unexpected.

But now I have had to say it to myself. It started with my dahlias! I love these flowers and have grown them in pots for years, and each autumn carefully lift the tubers, store them over winter and then start them all over again the next spring. Well, this year, two of my favorites 'bit the dust'. One I had kept (or its descendants) since I was a probationer Minister in the early 1970s given to me by a kindly elderly lady in one of my congregations. Even a new 'look alike' for which I am looking out will not be the same. However, to live is to change.

Then of course our Methodist Church has closed after a valiant battle by its faithful but diminishing congregation. We are all finding it strange not to gather there and have started to see each other in different local congregations. Naturally it does not quite feel the same, but to live is to change.

On the 3rd of this month, the Church celebrates the feast day of St Thomas the Apostle. He who had a very hard time after the death of Jesus believing about resurrection, especially as he had not had an early vision like some and who always wanted to know the far end of everything. Also, you will recall that Thomas could not comprehend what Jesus meant when he said, "I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also. And you know the way where I am going." Thomas's question that followed was "How can we know the way?" and this prompted Jesus' answer "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. "A phrase that has given such hope and support to many. For Thomas, and all the disciples, to live was to change.

In all of our lifetimes, no matter how old we are, many things have changed ~ and so have each of us ~ It is inevitable, and to state the obvious, time does not stand still.

The complete phrase of Cardinal Newman is "to live is to change, and to change often is to be perfect." While perfection is almost impossibly hard, like you I am surrounded by change, so I am resolved to go with it, enter into it with a positive spirit and enjoy my other dahlias, lest they feel abandoned. Hopefully Cardinal Newman and St Thomas would agree with that.



The sweet smell of rain


Have you ever noticed the sweet, fresh smell after a downpour of rain? That 'smell of rain' is called petrichor, and it fascinates scientists.


It was back in 1965 that scientists first named it. Petrichor comes from the Greek for stone, 'petra', and the golden fluid flowing through the veins of the immortals, 'ichor'.

Petrichor is produced when raindrops form air pockets on the rocks and soil, and softly force the release of aromatic chemicals trapped there. The petrichorscented compounds drift upwards into the atmosphere as a gas, like a glass of champagne.

The odour itself comes mainly from a chemical called geosmin, which is made by bacteria in soil. Geosmin is made by soil microbes, to fend off hungry worms. Geosmin is highly pungent, and even just five parts per trillion can be picked up by the human nose.

On 14 June 2023, the Rt. Rev. Stephen Wright, 52, currently Auxiliary Bishop in Birmingham, was appointed by Pope Francis as 15th Bishop of Hexham and Newcastle. He is due to be installed at St Mary's Cathedral on 14 July 2023.

Bishop Stephen - which is how he wishes to be known - was born in Stafford and later graduated in Law at Leicester University in 1992, was called to the bar at Lincoln's Inn in 1993 and practised as a barrister. After his decision to follow a very different vocation he completed his ecclesiastical studies at Saint Mary's College Seminary, Oscott in Birmingham and at the Venerable English College in Rome, obtaining a licentiate in theology at the Pontifical Gregorian University.

He was ordained as a priest in 2000 and was appointed parish priest in 2007, which he remained, albeit with ever-increasing other duties, until 2019. His twelve years' experience in the role has obviously remained with him. In his first letter as Bishop-Elect, he says: *I am delighted that at its heart a Bishop's ministry is like that of a Parish Priest. Stand with your people. Know them, serve them.*

He was appointed auxiliary Bishop in Birmingham, receiving episcopal consecration in October 2020.

He is a member of the Bishops' Advisory Panel supporting Bishop Paul Mason as Lead Safeguarding Bishop in the work of the Catholic Safeguarding Standards Agency (CSSA). He is a member of the Social Justice Department of the Bishops Conference with a focus on human rights and criminal/civil law matters.

This former Franciscan Monastery, now a summer Retreat Centre for the English College, high in the Alban hills overlooking Lake Albano, is cooler in summer than the centre of Rome eighteen



miles away. Joseph will be ordained as a priest at St Mary's Cathedral in Newcastle in 2024. Please keep him and his family in your prayers.



Earsdon Methodist Church July 2023




The first Primitive Methodist society met in 1825 at the home of John Lowes. It originally had only 8 members. It moved to a building in Teapot Close, which later became the Legion Hall and through the efforts of local blacksmith Joseph Lowes (a descendant of John) and James Hedley, the present building at Earsdon opened on Pentecost Sunday 1886. It was a much more central site.

The lower floor, known as 'the School Room' has seen many activities; one class of the local Day School -The Taylor Memorial School; our own Sunday School; during the 1939 -1945 World War The Royal Berkshire Regiment were stationed there, and many social gatherings including meals and coffee mornings.

After a lot of discussion, careful thought and prayers, we held the final service on 28th May, Pentecost Sunday and our 137th Church Anniversary, which was led by Rev Canon Wes Blakey and Rev Eva Walker.







The people who came filled the Church, all of whom had some connection with the Church, many travelling quite a distance to be there. Also, it was live streamed and we know that two people watched it in Alaska USA. There were tributes by Mr Norman Bloomfield, one of our oldest and longest serving members; Rev Walker who gave a tribute from the Circuit; and Mr Ian Baird and Mrs Bev Henderson also took part. It was a service tinged with sadness, for as well as marking the closure of the church only days before we heard of the sad death of our Minister Rev John Mason. Yet along with this we recalled some happy memories of events past and of the faithful people who had worked hard and inspired many both in the present and in the past.

At the close of the service the celebration cake was cut by the Bloomfields and most people stayed to share in conversation and memories and so we ended on a good note.

WORDSEARCH

On 3rd July the Church remembers St Thomas, also called Doubting Thomas, because he would not believe his fellow disciples' news of the Resurrection. But 'doubt' did not mean that Thomas did not love Jesus! Only a few weeks before, Thomas had urged his fellow disciples to follow Jesus to see Lazarus in Bethany, despite danger from the Jews. "Let us also go, that we may die with him." (John 11:16) Instead, Jesus had brought Lazarus back to life. Thomas was sometimes very confused about just where Jesus was headed. But in John 14:5 Jesus untangled his confused commitment: "I am going to my Father", and "No one comes unto the Father but by me." Finally, after the Resurrection, Jesus appeared to Thomas, showing him the wounds of His crucifixion. Thomas was electrified, and his response immediate: "My Lord and my God" (John 20.26). Thus Doubting Thomas' honest doubts, turned to honest faith, have become a reassurance for thousands of people down the centuries.
