THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH March 2022

Dear All,

As these things turn out this year, the first two days of March are both very significant, but in totally opposite ways.

March 1st [nip and a punch!] is Shrove Tuesday. This is an opportunity for one last blow-out before the fasting of Lent. That's why it's also known as 'Mardi Gras' – 'Fat Tuesday' – in some countries. I hope you enjoy your pancakes, with whatever is your favourite topping: bacon and maple syrup? Crushed-up Flake? Or maybe just the classic lemon and white sugar. Yum! Have a lovely Shrove Tuesday...

...before March 2nd, which is Ash Wednesday. The two days couldn't really be more different. From the flippin' exuberance of the one, to the solemn sorrow of the other. Sorrow for sin, that is. Ash Wednesday is an opportunity to measure the distance between 'holy, holy, holy God' and 'weak sinful me'. For those who would value it, it's an opportunity to receive the sign of the cross in ash on the forehead. Ash in the Bible signifies a regret for things done that we wish we hadn't. And the cross is the place where holy God enabled 'weak sinful me' to come into His presence.

Ash Wednesday fires the starting gun for Lent. And Lent is about so much more than 'giving something up'. It includes that, of course – it's an opportunity for me to discipline my body and its appetites. But how about 'taking something up' for Lent – something which will find me closer to God come Easter?

In that regard, March also sees the launch of our five-part Lent Course. Anglicans are reading Luke's Gospel this year, and there are several strong storylines in Jesus' teaching that we only find in Luke. So 'What's the Story?' will look at five of these...

The parable of the Good Samaritan is one of Jesus' best loved stories. What we often miss, though, is that at the time of Jesus, Jews and Samaritans were sworn enemies. So this is a tale about 'loving the unlikely'. Jesus covers lots of ground in his 'parable of the great banquet'. This is the story of a generous party host – clearly a picture of God. The party host puts on a fabulous spread and invites lots of guests. Lots of them decline the invitation, with ridiculous excuses bordering on the breathtakingly rude. But our host is not to be thwarted: his servants are sent out into the streets and alleys to find people who *do* want to come. The host wants his party to be full of guests: will you accept the invitation?

Luke himself tells us that Jesus' parable of 'The Persistent Widow' is about praying and praying and never giving up. A woman wears out a useless judge by coming and coming and demanding justice. Jesus wants to know if our lives of prayer will show the same persistence.

The parable of the Rich Fool is absolutely one for our times. This bloke piles up stuff for himself – it's all me, me, me. Then suddenly he dies, so what's his life all been about? He's missed the point of it all, which is to be 'rich towards God'.

And the course ends in early April with Jesus' sublime 'parable of the Prodigal Son'. This haunting tale would better be titled 'The parable of the father with two lost sons', because the bitter older brother who stays at home is equally as lost as the one who leaves and blows half the family estate.

All the way through, our course will look for fresh insights into these stories, and enmesh them with the stories of our own lives. Your church may well be doing something different for Lent. But if not, and you'd like to join in with ours, you'd be very welcome. There's an in-person version at St Mark's Shiremoor at 2pm from Wednesday March 9th, and on the evening of the same day a Zoom version starts [contact me for the link].

I wish you a rich journey through March, from the flippin' pancakes of the 1st, to its end by which time we'll nearly be ready to re-live the story of Holy Week.



BITS 'N' PIECES

It was...

100 years ago, on 10th March 1922 that Indian independence leader Mahatma Gandhi was arrested and charged with sedition for his campaign of noncooperation against the British Indian government. He was sentenced to six years in prison but released after two years as he needed surgery.

80 years ago, on 8th March 1942 that the bombing of Essen, Germany, took place. It was the first attack on a German city by the British RAF following the Area Bombing Directive of 14th February, which authorised the bombing of civilian areas.

Also 80 years ago, on 25th March 1942 that Aretha Franklin, the Queen of Soul, was born. The American soul/R&B/pop/gospel singer was known for her many hit songs including *Respect* and *I Say a Little Prayer*. (Died 2018)

70 years ago, on 11th March 1952 that Douglas Adams, British comedy writer and dramatist was born. Best known for *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy* series. (Died 2001)

60 years ago, on 19th March 1962 that the American folk-rock singer Bob Dylan released his debut album *Bob Dylan*.

50 years ago, on 24th March 1972 that the government of on 30th March 1972 that the British government introduced direct rule of Northern Ireland from Westminster (until 1999).

40 years ago, on 3rd March 1982 that the Barbican Centre in London was opened. It is the largest arts and conference venue in Europe.

30 years ago, on 19th March 1992 that Buckingham Palace announced the separation of the Duke and Duchess of York (Prince Andrew and Sarah Ferguson.)

25 years ago, on 6th March 1997 that Queen Elizabeth launched the official Royal website: <u>www.royal.gov.uk</u>

Also 25 years ago, on 21st March 1997 that the Rev W V Awdry, British clergyman and children's writer, died. Best known as the creator of *Thomas the Tank Engine*.

CHURCH VIEWS FOR MARCH 2022 FROM THE PARISH OF OUR LADY, STAR OF THE SEA

Synod 2023

Discussions via zoom took place in the parish, the final one being in late February, discussing how the parish and the Diocese and the Church can be more relevant in the 21st Century. The results of the discussions were finalised and forwarded to the Lay Pastoral Forum which will compile

them for Bishop Byrne in March. Also in February, parishes across the Diocese sent representatives for a morning of prayer, with the Bishop; talking, listening and giving their feedback on the Diocesan Synod process. At the end of the morning, Bishop Byrne said, "We've had a very fruitful morning...we go forward trusting each other and with a confidence in the joy and power of the Gospel."



The Bishop will consider the parish submissions together with the responses of the clergy, Caritas and other diocesan groups and produce his final submission in early April. The various submissions will be made available at each stage.

Normal service will be resumed....

You have to be a certain age to remember that famous BBC announcement, but it's still appropriate. From March there will be no need to book places for the weekend Masses in either church. Group meetings and social activities can be resumed at Immaculate Heart of Mary since it has been risk assessed and is a dual purpose building. Further good news is that the heating system there is to be updated. Fewer restrictions will be necessary as the national legal framework changes.

Lent 2022



Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on 2 March, although recent Covid restrictions may have felt like a long Lent already for some of us. Bishop Dunn Memorial Lecture

Although Bishop Kevin served only four years after his appointment in 2004, he is still fondly remembered for his lively interest in the Newcastle and Northumberland community. Here he is pictured with Alan Shearer in 2007 at the opening of the Alan Shearer Centre, for those with complex disabilities and acute sensory impairments. It was with those wider interests and the place of the Church in the community in mind that



the memorial Lectures were inaugurated after his untimely death on 1 March 2008.

Past Memorial Lectures have been given by many distinguished figures, including Sister Helen Prejean, noted for her work with condemned prisoners in the United States and recounted in her book Dead Man Walking, also the tile of the film which followed.



This year the Memorial Lecture will be given by Archbishop John Wilson of the Southwark Diocese who will ask "Is the Gospel Really Good News?" at 6.00pm at Ushaw on Tuesday 8 March 2022. We were sorry to hear of the death of Mr. George Bewick. George died on the twenty second of January aged 93 years.

Although he was not a member of the church he was a regular at the Lunch Club, enjoying his soup and sandwiches and the company of all around him. His electrical prowess was much appreciated, and he helped out when he could, just as he did for the Community Centre. Our prayers and condolences go to his family at this time.

I was once given a hellebore argutifolius.

I love saying that. It is one of the few Latin names for a flower that I know. It is better known as a Corsican hellebore and belongs to the same family as the Christmas rose. However, this year it seems to have gone down into the soil instead of rising from it. I think that I may have lost it, but nonetheless I will keep my eye on the patch where I know it is – or was!

I shall be sad if it has disappeared as this particular plant was rather special to me, for it was given to me by Daphne, a lovely lady who was a member of one of my former churches, who died some time ago now. She had grown this plant in her own garden, in which she also grew a whole variety of hellebores, which were a joy to see. This gift made me keen to look for different hellebore varieties ever since, and over the years I have managed to acquire and grow some.

I love these plants, especially as they flower during the early part of the year when little else is showing, and they bring cheer to a dull pre-Spring day.

Along with the plant, Daphne gave me a book outlining some of the folk tales surrounding it.

One such tale tells of an old French magician who was reputed to make himself invisible by scattering powdered hellebore over himself, thus passing through his debtors undetected.

I've never yet tried that with mine ~ but it's a thought!

Last year along with my other hellebores there were some seedlings around their bases, I took some of them and potted them up. They have survived the winter so far and although they are still quite small, I am hopeful that one may be a successor to the plant that has disappeared, although they don't always come true to type. I shall never be the gardener that Daphne was, but if I am successful I will at least be able to pass on to others, some plants that have brought joy to her and to me.

Of course it's not only gardeners who pass on good things to others – we all do, sometimes unknowingly and sadly sometimes infrequently. Let us make Lent a time of sharing not sacrificing and let us all try to share with someone something that will give them joy, we could even do it before this very day closes. It does not have to be a hellebore – but it could be !






Marti's Musings 96
