THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH November 2022

I'm writing this during the half-term school holiday. My daughters and I spent yesterday in the small city of Ripon, in North Yorkshire. We were there because I thought it would be good to see the cathedral, which I couldn't remember ever having visited before.

On entering the building, we were welcomed by a lovely guide who was keen to tell us a bit about the place, giving us leaflets and a floor plan. My older daughter walked around with her floor plan, and remarked to me that she'd noticed the cathedral was built in the shape of a cross. I replied immediately "of course – churches are always built in the shape of a cross". She was surprised, and really fascinated by this fact. *

It's funny: I had assumed she knew this. We often just presume that everyone has the same set of knowledge that we have, don't we? And we often seek out people who are similar to us, who know similar things to us, don't we? That's natural human behaviour – seeking connection to others. But I think it's also really important to remember that not everyone knows the same things we know, believes the same things we believe, or experiences the world in the way we do. I think that it's of real value to learn more about what makes people tick – especially people whose world view is different from ours.

Often, it's all too easy to be drawn in by stereotypes. For example, many people think all Muslims are violent, not least because the media often portrays that view. But if you look deeper into Islam, you realise that, in its purest form, it's actually a religion of peace, and it has more in common with Christianity than you might think.

Christians are also often misunderstood. People can think that we're boring do-gooders, who never put a foot wrong. Or that we live in the clouds and have no concept of what the world is really like. Or that you can't be a Christian unless you're perfect. But we can let people know that Christians are very much rooted in the real world, and that Christianity isn't all about getting everything right – it's about trying to follow the example of Christ but sometimes getting it wrong.

This month, let's try to learn more about others'	world views,	and break
down stereotypical views about our own.

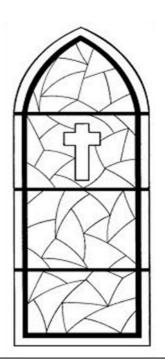

It was...

175 years ago, on 4th November 1847 that Scottish obstetrician James Young Simpson discovered the anaesthetic properties of chloroform. He helped popularise its use in medicine.

125 years ago, on 15th November 1897 that Aneurin 'Nye' Bevan, British politician was born. He was the Minister of Health 1945-51 who led the establishment of the National Health Service.

80 years ago, on 5th November 1942 that the WW2 Second Battle of El-Alamein ended. British troops led by Generals Alexander and Montgomery defeated Rommel's German forces in Egypt. On 10th November, Winston Churchill announced: "This is not Also 30 years ago, on the end. It is not even

the beginning of the end. But it is, perhaps, the end of the beginning."

75 years ago, on 20th November 1947 that the marriage of Princess Elizabeth and Philip Mountbatten, Duke of Edinburgh, took place at Westminster Abbey in London.

40 years ago, on 2nd November 1982 that Channel 4 Television was launched in the UK.

Also 40 years ago, on 30th November 1982 that Michael Jackson's album *Thriller* was released.

30 years ago, on 11th November 1992 that the Church of England voted to allow women to become priests. The first women were ordained in March 1994.

20th November 1992

that the Windsor Castle fire broke out in a private chapel and spread to a large part of the building. Damage was extensive and took five years to repair, at a cost of £40 million. Buckingham Palace was opened to the public for the first time to help raise the money.

20 years ago, on 11th November 2002 that Microsoft founder Bill Gates pledged \$100 million to help fight AIDS in India.

Also 20 years ago, on 15th November 2002 that Myra Hindley, one of the notorious 'Moors Murderers' (with Ian Brady) died.

CHURCH VIEWS FOR NOVEMBER 2022 FROM THE PARISH OF OUR LADY, STAR OF THE SEA



Parish War Memorial Panels, St Edward's Church

November always turns our thoughts to those who gave their lives in the 'War to end all Wars' and the second World War which sadly followed.

St Edward's Parish, as it was then, like so many others, suffered losses out of all proportion to its size. Headed "Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted", the 1914-18 memorial panel lists 17 soldiers and sailors. Unlike many memorials of the time, the list is alphabetical and not by rank, so it begins with a Private, John Barry of the New Zealand Rifle Brigade, and ends with a Captain, Herbert White of the Tyneside Irish. The panel ends with a commemoration of all those killed while serving with the Tyneside Irish.



The 103rd (Tyneside Irish) Infantry Brigade consisted of four 'Pals Battalions' incorporated into the North-umberland Fusiliers. 'Pals Battalions' were formed from volunteers with a common bond, like the 'Tyneside Scottish', and 'Tyneside Irish' sharing a common ancestral or religious heritage or the 'Tyneside Commercials' who were all office workers.

Like all such local battalions, losses hit their communities very hard. In 1916 on only the first day of the Battle of the Somme, 1100 men of the Tyneside Irish were killed and hundreds more wounded; its losses continued to mount right up to the Armistice in 1918. The Colour of the 27th Battalion NF (2nd Battalion Tyneside Irish) is laid up in St Mary's Cathedral.

The World War II memorial panel is mercifully shorter with 9 names, including one woman, Private Norienne Phoebe Quinn, marking the vital contribution made by women in that conflict.

May they and all their comrades rest in peace


- * Sunday 13th November Holy Communion 8.30am at St John's

Marti's Musings 104


